


A new year and plenty of new opportunities in art, music and theatre in London.

### Tree

'Daniel Kitson and Tim Key are amazing' were the first words I uttered after witnessing the comedy genius of Kitson – who wrote the play – and the hilarious delivery and timing of Tim Key, who costars.

Kitson completely transforms the very stage of the Old Vic and moreover places an enormous tree (hence the title) in the middle of it.

The play itself is witty and sharp, and the narrative is essentially; man in a tree, tells a long and humorous tale about being in a tree, Tim Key's character falls for it and in the end discovers he was lied to.

At this point you should be aware that my 'synopsis' doesn't even come close to doing the play justice, and therefore you shall have to see it for yourselves! I implore you. Kitson's Tree is brilliantly clever and stomach achingly funny.

Tree is almost sold out, so be quick!

# The Music Segment

I hope everyone has had a refreshing and (hopefully) productive Christmas break! For this edition, I thought I would focus more on local concerts and musical events happening this term, including events in school.

First up is a performance on **10th February** at Carshalton All Saints Church (opposite Carshalton Ponds) starting at 5pm to raise money for the *Camps International* Cambodia project, as well as the Church's Organ Fund, organised by me and one of the groups I am in – *The Agenda*, with Alex Hubbard and Jonathan Yarwood. We will be performing a varied mix of genres ranging from the Jazz of *Take Five* to less... conventional pieces for the clarinet, including *Smells Like Teen Spirit*.

Entry will be free, with refreshments provided by volunteers raising money for the *Camps International* Cambodia expedition. If you're unsure of how to get to the Church, email me for directions.

I'm also doing a 20–30 minute recital between March and April (another announcement with a more definitive date will be made closer to the time) largely consisting of Classical pieces ranging from Mozart's Clarinet Concerto to Debussy's *La Fille Aux Cheveux de Lin* as well as *Take Five* with the woodwind/piano teacher Anna Arnold and also Alex Hubbard (for *Take Five*).

Entry will, as with the other concert, be free, with invitations being sent out in the coming weeks. Again, if you are interested, email me and I can send over the details.

Alongside these confirmed performances this term, there are a number of other performances happening in and around school in the coming months involving the Sixth Form's resident rock band *New Time Classics* as part of a charity event at an unconfirmed date, as well as performances by the Orchestras of the Sutton Music Service on the Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of the week beginning **23rd March**.

In the next Music Segment, the usual focus on a specific London venue will return alongside (hopefully) a few more announcements about local concerts from our resident bands and music groups.
